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ABOUT THE RUBICON MASONIC SOCIETY

Founded in 2013, The Rubicon Masonic Society (TRMS) is an invitation-only Masonic interest group of Master Masons. Originally, the Society was established as a Masonic dinner club for Masons who sought more education, discussion about Freemasonry, and the fellowship that accompanied such specific offerings outside of regular lodge.

Members of the Society are dedicated to the preservation of expressive fellowship as a means of transmitting wisdom, improving themselves, and the world around them. Meetings are held in Lexington where brothers enjoy a meal, fellowship, and Masonic education presentations along with purposeful discussions about the fraternity and, of course, Freemasonry.

RMS does not practice any Masonic ritual or use Masonic regalia, signs, or titles. There is no initiatic process, and no degrees conferred. The group merely seeks to enjoy the conviviality of like-minded men and engage in meaningful discussion. Member status in the Society requires these men remain actively engaged and involved with their respective lodges.

Member status is not considered a substitute for involvement in regular Freemasonry.



Rubicon stands as an example of a small group of men who, determined to constructively advance the Masonic experience, can further unite men in fellowship and Brotherhood for the good of the fraternity.


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Rubicon Masonic Dinner Club

In 2015 the group approved the collection of two volumes of essays and commentaries by well-known Masonic authors, titled,

Taking Stock in American Freemasonry. These two anthologies were published through 2017 and made available at no cost to Kentucky Masons, research lodges and Masonic libraries in twenty-two jurisdictions.





Although the purpose the purpose of the group, to study the historical aim and purpose of the fraternity and promote the understanding of Freemasonry through education and Masonic events, remained the same, the name was changed in 2016 to The Rubicon Masonic Society. The original motto, "Irrevocabilis se Commitet" (*irrevocability*

committed) did not change, but the logo did.¹

Since 2013, TRMS has annually sponsored and coordinated Masonic Festive Boards for which it has become known nationwide. These events, as well as many regular meetings, symposiums, and assemblies for Masonic education and fellowship are coordinated and orchestrated by members of the Society, and open to Masons of all degrees. Many are held at historic Spindletop Hall in Lexington, Kentucky.²

² Spindletop Hall, located at 3414 Iron Works Pike in Lexington, KY, is the former home of Pansy Yount, wife of Miles Franklin Yount of the Yount-Lee Oil Company. It is currently the home of the University of Kentucky's staff, faculty, and alumni club, which was founded in 1962.

The RMS hosted The Masonic Society's 2017, "Centuries of American Freemasonry" national conferences in Lexington. The conference included attendees from fourteen jurisdictions.

In 2019, the Society hosted the Masonic Restoration Foundation (MRF) 10th Annual Meeting at Spindletop. Co-hosted by Lexington Lodge 1, a Called Communication was held at the Lodge for the participants from twelve jurisdictions.









In response to the postponement of lodge and Masonic events during the 2020 Covid-19 Pandemic, The


RMS turned to virtual tools and communications to continue Masonic education labors.

Joining with Lexington Lodge No. 1 and the William O. Ware Lodge of Research, a series of virtual meetings were organized and presented from May 2020 through the 2021 calendar year. Episodes of the virtual education series were, for a period, presented each Monday evening. Later the series was offered twice a month, and in 2021, once a month since lodges and events were beginning to resume their meetings.

At the end of the series in 2021, a total of thirty-two Masonic education meetings were held with an average attendance of 66 from twenty-American jurisdictions and five other countries. Recordings of series were posted as accessible links on several Masonic websites as well as YouTube, where they have enjoyed over 4,000 views.
















































In March 2021, The RMS compiled Masonic Book Reviews and Summaries, Edition III, which was distributed to over 2,500 Masons around the nation.

The publication offers summary reviews of over 83 contemporary Masonic books and important, classic Masonic writings that were published in the 20th century.

In late 2021, Rubicon, in conjuection with Lexington Lodge 1, William O. Ware Lodge of Research, the Masonic Restoration Foundation, and ten additional Masonic co-sponsors, will be producing a professionally filmed and scripted documentary about Festive Boards and Harmony dinner events. The production is sheeduled for filming in July 2021 and projected for release in late 2021 or early 2022.
